You can use the funding to:

- start a new activity or continue an existing one
- help your organisation adapt to new challenges

We fund projects that:

- bring people together to build strong relationships in and across communities
- improve the places and spaces that matter to communities
- help more people to reach their potential, by supporting them at the earliest possible stage.

Organisations must be led by, and accountable to support 10 organisations in its first year.

Eligible costs include staff wages, training, governance improvements, IT upgrades, transport, utilities, volunteer expenses, evaluation, equipment, minor capital works, and translation services for non-English speakers.

Successful applications will focus on one or two of our key funding areas:

- Climate action—promoting healthy, thriving communities by preventing, preparing for and protecting against the impacts of climate change
- Financial wellbeing—helping people take control of their wellbeing by giving them the tools to be more financially independent and ready for anything

If your Organisation's core mission is aligned to one of these key funding areas, then it is also acceptable for your Project to be fundraising to cover your Organisation's usual operational costs.
