Providing funding for projects that bring people together to build strong relationships and improve communities in England. You can apply for a grant of between £300 and £20,000 for projects lasting up to 2 years.

You can use the funding to:

- start a new activity or continue an existing one
- help your organisation adapt to new challenges

We fund projects that:

- bring people together to build strong relationships in and across communities
- improve the places and spaces that matter to communities
- help more people to reach their potential, by supporting them at the earliest possible stage

Who can apply:

- Constituted voluntary or community organisation, Constituted group or club, Registered charity, Charitable incorporated organisation (CIO), Not-for-profit company
- Community interest company (CIC) limited by guarantee or limited by shares (if limited by shares, you must follow the Regulator of Community Interest Companies' guidance on sharing profits)
- School – can only fund your project if it mainly benefits and involves the communities around the school
- Statutory body (including local authorities, town, parish, and community councils)
- Community benefit society

Grant amount: £300 - £20,000

Fund projects that:

Who can apply: If your organisation works with communities in England and is a:

- Voluntary or community organisation with a written constitution, Registered charity, charitable incorporated organisation (CIO), Not-for-profit company limited by guarantee, community interest company (CIC), School, Public body (for example, local authority, town, parish or community council), Community benefit society (registered with the Financial Conduct Authority), co-operative society (also registered with the Financial Conduct Authority)

Grant amount: £20,001 - £20,000,000

Fund projects that:

- support places, people or communities experiencing poverty, disadvantage or discrimination
- support people and communities to shape the decisions that affect their live

You can also apply as a partnership, but only if you've worked together before on projects that support communities to lead change and address the root causes of inequality.

Grant amount: Between £1 million and £5 million

The funding is being made available through National Lottery Community Fund's Solidarity Fund and will support work that empowers communities, fosters collaboration, and amplifies community voices to influence public understanding of inequality.

Organisations must be led by, and accountable to support 10 organisations in its first year.

Eligible costs include staff wages, training, governance improvements, IT upgrades, transport, utilities, volunteer expenses, evaluation, equipment, minor capital works, and translation services for non-English speakers.

Grant amount: £500,000 to £5 million

The UK Fund offers larger amounts of funding to help you develop work that's already making a difference. To get funding you'll need to show what's working, how you know it's having a proven impact, and why it's ready to scale. We do not fund brand-new projects or services. Aims to tackle the root causes of social disadvantage. The Steve Morgan Foundation's Regional Grants programme supports work across three key themes: education, access to provision (such as health, housing, and youth services), and employment.

Who can apply:

Charities and organisations who aim to aid the research into learning disability and to aid the care and relief of those affected by learning disability. For full clarity on the Fund's remit please refer to the published eligibility information. The Fund does not currently accept appeals from Community Interest Companies.

Grant amount: from £250 and depend on a number of factors including the purpose, the total funding requirement and the potential sources of other funds including, in some cases, matching funding.

Applications for capital and revenue costs and for both specific projects and for general running/core costs are considered.

The following areas of work normally fall within the Fund's current policy providing they benefit the learning disabled:

- Capital building/renovation/refurbishment works for residential, nursing and respite care, and schools;
- Employment schemes including woodwork, crafts, printing and horticulture;
- Play schemes and play therapy schemes;
- Day and social activities centres including building costs and running costs;

Grant amount: £50,000 - £150,000

Fund projects that are community led and co-designed, staff costs for project roles and up to 15% overheads/core costs. The projects must fit under at least one of the themes below:

1. Cultural Responsiveness in Cancer Care - Projects that help healthcare services better understand and meet the cultural needs of different communities and remove barriers to person-centred care.
2. Shared Decision-Making - Projects that make it easier for people to understand their treatment options, take part in decisions about their cancer care, and reduce unfair differences in how this happens.
3. Dementia-Friendly Cancer Care - Projects that support people living with both cancer and dementia, improve their care experience, and help them and their carers take part in treatment decision

- Have a safeguarding policy, procedures, training and checks in place (if you work with or are in contact with children and/or vulnerable adults)
- Conduct risk assessments as standard for all activities
- Have appropriate insurance in place
- Have a governing document or constitution
- Produce annual accounts

Grant amount: £1,000 - £10,000 For 12 months

Funder is specifically looking to support projects that support deaf children aged between 0 and 5 years old and their families. Your project can support early years children directly or indirectly.

Applications will also need to show how they meet the funders priorities:

- Understanding the needs of your community
- Working together to create a project idea and design
- Involving and engaging with new people and other organisations in your community.
- Increasing the number of deaf children and families being able to access opportunities.
- Ensuring projects are accessible for deaf children and their families
- Identifiable short and long term benefits that impact deaf children and their families, ensuring that no deaf child is held back

The grant is intended to cover the essential running costs of your project, such as venue hire, transport, promotional costs, wages for sessional workers, interpreters and language tutors and equipment that is essential for the project such as play equipment or technology.

Grants must not be used for services that are provided as standard by government funded education or health services

- Has been established for a minimum of two years

- Does not financially benefit directors, trustees, members

Any grant awarded will incur an additional CTP cost:

**Contributing Third Party Payment (CTP Payment)

If your application is successful, you will need to arrange a CTP payment of 10% of your grant amount, to the landfill operator, before your grant can be released. This payment is retained by the landfill operator to cover the 10% tax credit shortfall, it is never refunded.

Who can apply: Approved animal welfare charities working to rescue and care for animals that have suffered cruelty. Eligible organisations must be registered charities with a proven track record in animal welfare work.

Grant amount: The Animal Defence Trust website gives no information on the minimum or maximum grants available.

The Trust's main objectives are protecting animals from suffering and mistreatment, promoting research to reduce animal use in scientific experiments, and ensuring proper accommodation for animals during transportation. It provides grant funding to registered charities in the United Kingdom and internationally that are actively involved in animal rescue and rehabilitation efforts.

The grants, which are for capital projects and running costs, aim to support a wide range of activities, including providing shelter, medical treatment, and care for abused or neglected animals.

- UK Registered Charity with two or more annual returns submitted on time to the Charity Commission
- UK Publicly Exempt Charity: most museums/galleries are Registered Charities, but not all (refer to eligibility criteria in guidelines)

Grant amount: Awards grants of up to £7,000 to UK registered charities.
