Pride in Place Runcorn Grants Programme

Pride in Place is a 10-year government programme giving communities the power and funding to improve local spaces, support culture, and boost pride in where they live. Runcorn is one of 250 areas that will have £20 million investment over 10 years. Through community consultation, local people have already identified key themes that they would like to see implemented in Runcorn Old Town.

There are two sizes of grant pots available:

- Micro grants of up to £250 per project
- Grow grants of £1k - £5k per project

Funding News

Arts council: Culture Secretary Lisa Nandy has announced a £1.5 billion package for cultural organisations across the country. Within the package announced, the Arts Council will deliver the following programmes up to 2030:

£160 million investment into local and regional museums: The Museum Estate and Development Fund will return, continuing to help museums tackle maintenance backlogs.

A new £13.6 million Museum Transformation programme which will support organisations to move towards more sustainable business models.

£425 million for the Creative Foundations Fund, which will further support capital projects in arts venues across the country.

£27.5 million for the Libraries Improvement Fund, which supports public libraries to upgrade their buildings and technology to meet changing needs and better serve their communities

- Community interest company (CIC) limited by guarantee or limited by shares (if limited by shares, you must follow the Regulator of Community Interest Companies' guidance on sharing profits)
- School – can only fund your project if it mainly benefits and involves the communities around the school

You can also apply as a partnership, but only if you've worked together before on projects that support communities to lead change and address the root causes of inequality.

Grant amount: Between £1 million and £5 million

The funding is being made available through National Lottery Community Fund's Solidarity Fund and will support work that empowers communities, fosters collaboration, and amplifies community voices to influence public understanding of inequality.

Organisations must be led by, and accountable to support 10 organisations in its first year. Eligible costs include staff wages, training, governance improvements, IT upgrades, transport, utilities, volunteer expenses, evaluation, equipment, minor capital works, and translation services for non-English speakers.

Charities and organisations who aim to aid the research into learning disability and to aid the care and relief of those affected by learning disability. For full clarity on the Fund's remit please refer to the published eligibility information. The Fund does not currently accept appeals from Community Interest Companies.

Grant amount: from £250 and depend on a number of factors including the purpose, the total funding requirement and the potential sources of other funds including, in some cases, matching funding.

Applications for capital and revenue costs and for both specific projects and for general running/core costs are considered.

The following areas of work normally fall within the Fund's current policy providing they benefit the learning disabled:

- Capital building/renovation/refurbishment works for residential, nursing and respite care, and schools;
- Employment schemes including woodwork, crafts, printing and horticulture;

Who can apply:

To be able to apply, all applicants must:

- Be based in the UK
- Be a group or organisation with a UK bank or building society account
- Have a safeguarding policy, procedures, training and checks in place (if you work with or are in contact with children and/or vulnerable adults)
- Conduct risk assessments as standard for all activities
- Have appropriate insurance in place
- Have a governing document or constitution
- Produce annual accounts

Grant amount: £1,000 - £10,000 For 12 months

Funder is specifically looking to support projects that support deaf children aged between 0 and 5 years old and their families. Your project can support early years children directly or indirectly.

Applications will also need to show how they meet the funders priorities:

- Understanding the needs of your community
- Working together to create a project idea and design
- Involving and engaging with new people and other organisations in your community.
- Increasing the number of deaf children and families being able to access opportunities.
- Ensuring projects are accessible for deaf children and their families
- Identifiable short and long term benefits that impact deaf children and their families, ensuring that no deaf child is held back

The grant is intended to cover the essential running costs of your project, such as venue hire, transport, promotional costs, wages for sessional workers, interpreters and language tutors and equipment that is essential for the project such as play equipment or technology.

Grants must not be used for services that are provided as standard by government funded education or health services

Grant amount:

- Standard grants of up to £2,000

Large grant applications should be towards specific projects, research or equipment rather than running costs.

For medically related charities, hospitals, hospices and medical clinics:

The Hospital Saturday Fund will consider giving grants towards medical capital projects, medical care or research and in support of medical training. The Hospital Saturday Fund will also consider grants for running costs.

For Individuals:

The Hospital Saturday Fund will consider giving partial or full grants to individuals for the following:

****Contributing Third Party Payment (CTP Payment)**

If your application is successful, you will need to arrange a CTP payment of 10% of your grant amount, to the landfill operator, before your grant can be released. This payment is retained by the landfill operator to cover the 10% tax credit shortfall, it is never refunded.

The government has committed to a UK-wide £9M creative careers service, £3M per year over financial years 26/27-28/29. Of this, approximately £1.6M will be designated for the DCMS-led communications campaign, and £400k for evaluation.

Grant recipients should provide a budget proposal which details how they would allocate funds to different programme activities and between the four nations in order to achieve the grant's objectives.

The objectives of this grant are as follows:

- To improve knowledge of pathways and opportunities in the Creative Industries (CIs) for young people (of school age, 11-18, or young people searching for work, 16-24) who engage with the programme and/or are in the campaign audience.
- To improve knowledge of pathways and opportunities in the CIs among young people's influencers who are engaged in the programme and/or are in the campaign audience (teachers, parents, careers advisors, work coaches).
- To stimulate sector investment and engagement in the talent pipeline.
- To provide opportunities for young people to directly interact with the sector, through encounters or work experience.
- To increase regional and demographic diversity in the entry-level workforce.
